There is a lot of flexibility in choosing your Philosophy elective; however, as you plan your course selections, keep the following in mind:

- 200-level courses should be taken in freshman and sophomore years.

- 300-level courses are more demanding and should be reserved for junior and senior years.

We also strongly recommend that you complete the history sequence (PHIL 231, 232, 233) prior to taking the area sequence (311, 312, 313, 314). Please note that juniors and seniors have the opportunity to engage in independent research.

> Note: No college credits are earned when a student receives a language waiver. When a waiver is earned, the credits currently assigned to foreign language study must be fulfilled through general electives of the student's choosing.
